ear Friends,

John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement that gave birth to the United Methodist Churchas well as other "Methodist-based" denominations—lived his entire life in the eighteenth century (1703-1791). Wesley lived in a turbulent time; the industrial Revolution began in the 1760s, eliciting concerns about the tremendous growth of cities, meeting people's basic health care needs and child labor laws. The chasm between the rich and the poor grew as the Protestant movement shook the foundations of the Orthodox and Catholic Church, and hearts were opened to new religious ideas and practices.

Wesley was very concerned with the social issues of his day and how people behaved toward money and wealth—especially when caring for those marginalized in a quickly changing society. In his classic sermon, "The Use of Money," Wesley defined some basic practices regarding money and wealth. He wrote, "Having, first, gained all you can, and, secondly saved all you can, then 'give all you can." In his book, Earn. Save. Give, Pastor Jim Harnish offers Wesley's wisdom in modern language: Earn all you can. Save all you can. Give all you can. (Pages 12 and 13)

Over two centuries after Wesley shared his concern, I have to say that, as a pastor in the Methodist stream of Protestantism, I remain concerned with people's attitudes and behavior about money. It is one of my greatest concerns as I work with young couples preparing for marriage. It is of great interest and concern as I work with the financial leaders of our church; trying to do more with less and maintaining our beautiful facilities. More than those concerns about what we might call the "mechanics" of money, I am concerned about people's heart, priorities, attitudes and struggles when it comes to talking about money.

As our annual stewardship campaign in October begins, I invited you to be involved any number of ways available to you. During the four Sundays of the campaign I will offer messages based on Pastor Harnish's book. There is a companion devotional book you may purchase and read throughout the month. You can also participate in one of three studies offered beginning on September 30. Those studies are outline in this issue of the Chimes. All I ask is that you get involved with our Stewardship Program in October at the level with which you are comfortable, but with the encouragement to stretch your faith.

It is my hope that we can grow together in our understanding of stewardship as part of living faithfully, as we seek to follow Jesus the Christ at Central Church. I look forward to seeing you in worship.

Ministry Spotlight: HOPE Warming Center

HOPE Hospitality and Warming Center, Inc. (previously called Place of HOPE) was founded in 1998 as a community response to a person freezing to death in downtown Pontiac. Since this time, the center has provided seasonal emergency shelter for individuals in northern Oakland County, turning no one away.

The shelter hosts guests each night, providing warmth, an evening meal, a shower, a safe place to sleep, and—on many mornings—a light breakfast. The center also provides its guests with hygiene kits and dry socks and underwear.

Central Church has a 15 year tradition of serving the homeless at the HOPE Shelter. Volunteers prepare dinner in the church kitchen for approximately 80 guests, serve the meal and clean up. Central volunteers also assist with shower sign up and the distribution of personal hygiene kits. **This fall,**

Central will be serving Friday September 21st, Saturday Sept 22nd and Monday September 24th.

Volunteers leave the church at 6:30pm, ride together to HOPE and return about 9:45pm.

Central's HOPE Shelter Ministry is led by Cheryl Hinsberg, Deb Hayden-Schmid and Shiela Strang. This ministry provides an opportunity for Central's members to live out our mission of connecting with God, connecting with others and changing our world with Christ's love. Prayers are appreciated for the clients, staff and

volunteers at HOPE Shelter.

Monetary donations are also being accepted. It takes about \$200 per night to prepare dinner and provide paper products for the meal. If you would like to help, please bring your donation to the church office or put it in the offering plate. Label check donations with "HOPE Shelter."

About HOPE Shelter

Hope Shelter serves 500 individuals per year, of which 32% are homeless for the first time. HOPE Shelter is more than a nightly meal and place to sleep. Its comprehensive service model provides guests with wide-ranging support to help them find a permanent path out of homelessness.
