returned. Sometimes it seems that the church is paralyzed because the tasks of the church can be so tremendous – the needs are so immense! Good planning leads to focused implementation, allowing us to do a few things very well, truly making a difference in the lives of others! Praise God!

Thursday, July 2

Read Luke 24:44-53. Verse 45 tells us that Jesus opened the minds of the disciples to understand scripture. Jesus further spoke of his death and resurrection. Jesus reminds the disciples, "You are witnesses of these things."

The word witness in the Greek is connected to the word which we translate "martyr." While we are not required by our faith to suffer death, we are to lay down our lives in service to God's Kingdom. The Apostle Paul called for a "living sacrifice." (Romans 12:1)

For what would you offer a "living sacrifice?" What needs in the world – in our own area – capture your heart? Where can you Find A Need And Fill It? Write your thoughts here and pray that God will open your eyes to new possibilities for our church!

Monday, June 29

Read Acts 1:1-11 and Luke 24:44-53. Luke is the author of both the gospel that bears his name and Acts. You could say that Acts is the sequel to the Gospel of Luke! This week's meditation and study guide is all about dreaming. Our dreams give us visions of a future; hopefully a future that is guided and blessed by God, empowered by the Holy Spirit!

Today, think of a ministry or event in the church (Central U.M.C. or another church you've attended) that was exciting and successful. What made that ministry or event successful? Write your thoughts here and give thanks to God for such meaningful experiences in the church!

Tuesday, June 30

Read Acts 1:1-11 again focusing on verses 6-8. We can learn much from these three verses. First, there are elements of our work that we need not worry about, like the timing of God's Kingdom – we have our work to do within God's Kingdom and should focus on that work. Second, we will be given the power to accomplish what God has called us to do. Third, the scope of the work will have a "ripple effect" to the "ends of the earth."

There is a plan – God's plan. We pray that God's plan will happen each time we recite The Lord's Prayer; "on earth as it is in heaven." While we seek to do God's work in the Kingdom, we should spend time planning our own work within that Kingdom. As for any organization or individual: "When you fail to plan, you plan to fail." Our task, as the church, is to make sure our plans as a local congregation are God inspired and Holy Spirit empowered. Pray that Central U.M.C. will develop plans that will make a difference in the lives of others and change our world!

Wednesday, July 1

Again read Acts 1:1-11 focusing on verses 9-11. After seeing Jesus ascend into heaven, the disciples just stood around gazing upward. It took two messengers from God to jar them from their paralyzed state to realize they had work to do! There is a saying, "We run the risk in the church of being so heavenly minded that we are of no earthly good."

For the disciples in the early church, there were certainly the aweinspiring events involved in knowing Jesus personally. There was also the thought in those ancient days that Jesus was about to come back very soon, so why do anything? Many believe that they should just "sit tight" and everything will be fine when Jesus
