Dear Central Church Family,

We've begun this year with a series of messages titled *Doxology*. When you hear the word doxology you probably think of the brief hymn sung as the offering is brought forward during the worship service to be blessed. The words are familiar: "Praise God from whom all blessings flow, Praise Him, all creatures here below, Praise Him above the Heavenly host, Praise Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Amen." It was sung to the tune that was called Old 100th for centuries and in 1989 the United Methodist Hymnal included an alternative musical setting that had been in use but was not officially in our hymnal. It incorporates "Alleluias" in the words above and changes "Holy Ghost" to "Holy Spirit."

The doxology is more than just that one brief hymn; a doxology is actually a literary device in ancient writings offering a majestic declaration of praise to God. We find doxologies sprinkled throughout our scriptures. Doxology literally means the study of praise; "ology" means study and "doxo" means opinion or glory. Doxologies have become short hymns of praise, usually from the scriptures, and are often used as benedictions at the end of worship services.

The Doxology which is the foundation for our messages beginning this year was written by the Apostle Paul: "Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. Amen." (Ephesians 3:20-21) As we enter 2021 with renewed hope for our lives, our church, our nation and world, it seems fitting to remember that our God "is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine."

More than that, we must remember the first part of this passage, "Now to him who by the power at work *within us* is able." God is able because of the power that is already at work within each of us. Paul was fond of calling the church "the body of Christ." We must remember that we are called individually and collectively to be the body of Christ in the world today; we are to carry out the mission and ministry that Jesus began.

With all that concerns us today—from the COVID-19 pandemic to violence surrounding our election process to economic woes, all while attempting to seek justice and inclusion for all people (but specifically for black and LGBTQIA persons)—it is an overwhelming responsibility to be Jesus in the world today! The purpose of the messages beginning this year is to continue meaningful conversations about God's call and desire for all people to be whole and valued. (I Timothy 2:1-4)

Our God is able. Our God desires to work in and through us—the church. I guess the question for each of us to answer is, "Are we able?" I look forward to seeing you in worship.


