their journey was labeled "unwanted" during the message.

The first half of their journey was easier than the second half which included some hills and mountains. Most scholars believe that Mary and Joseph walked the journey, however, there is some thought that they may have secured a donkey on which Mary could ride. The roads would have been dusty or muddy and there may have been hostiles waiting to prey on vulnerable travelers. What do you think Mary and Joseph discuss as they traveled? What emotions do you believe they expressed? Do you think you could make the journey? Ponder these questions and write your response here.

Thursday, December 23

We spoke about the journey of Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem being unwanted. We each will take undesired journeys in our lives. Journeys home from work after being laid off or furloughed, journeys to the hospital for cancer treatments, journeys to a rehab center to take a child with addiction, journeys to the cemetery to lay a beloved spouse to rest. What have been your undesired journeys? Did you learn anything from those "travels?" Can you see how God could redeem your unwanted journeys for God's purposes? Write your thoughts here.
