Read Psalm 127. This is a great Psalm that expressed the blessing of God upon our labors. Unless the Lord builds the house or the Lord watches over the city, our efforts are in vain. It's an issue of discovering what God is doing in our world and joining God's efforts as opposed to simply asking God to bless our efforts - whatever they may be.

How can you "get on board" with God and do that which God is already doing – so that our efforts are not in vain? Pray for God's insights and write your thoughts here.

Tuesday and Wednesday, November 22 and 23 Read Mark 12:28-44. "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength." answered Jesus when asked what is the greatest commandment. What does it mean to you to love God with all your heart, soul, mind and strength?

Often we look at this "greatest" commandment as an impossible burden – one that would diminish any other efforts in our lives. We think, "If I am that devoted to God, then I could accomplish no other thing in this life!"
