What do you cherish most about the resurrection narrative? What portions confound you? Is there anything new that you picked up on from today's reading about the resurrection? What are your earliest memories of the resurrection? Meditate upon these questions and write your thoughts here.

### Friday, April 14

Read Matthew 28:1-10. Pastor Jack mentioned that it is fitting for one of the woman to be unidentified. "The other Mary" is rather non-descriptive and allows us to place ourselves in the narrative. We can then respond to the call that the women received from both the angel of the Lord and Jesus. Three callings: to believe, to share and to rejoice. Thinking of your reflections from yesterday's devotion, what does the Easter event call you to believe? How do you share those beliefs? How do you rejoice, not only in the gift of resurrection but in these callings from God and Jesus the Christ? Meditate on these questions and write your responses here.

### Jesus and the Psalms – NOW! It Is Finished! \*

### Monday, April 10

Holy Week is truly a roller coaster of emotions and feeling as we watch Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem and then the turning over of the money changers' tables in the Temple, the final teachings of Jesus, The Last Supper, the arrest of Jesus, his trial, death and then that period of waiting from Friday evening to Sunday morning. Hopefully, Easter brings a great festival of praise and thanksgiving as well as opportunities to gather as family and friends to enjoy each other's company and some yummy foods. What emotions have you experienced this past week as we've journeyed with Jesus remembering his last week on earth? How do the more somber experiences this past week affect your appreciation of Easter morning? Contemplate these questions and write your reflections here.

### Tuesday, April 11

Read Psalm 22. This is an incredible Psalm, not only in terms of its insightfulness into human suffering but that it expressed deep and abiding faith in our God who is present to us, trustworthy and will deliver us. The first half of the Psalm is fully appropriate for Good Friday as we commemorate Jesus' suffering and death on the cross. It is easy to draw parallels between what the writer is experiencing to what Jesus experienced in his excruciating last hours on earth. Even in the midst of suffering the writer of this Psalm in thankful for God's goodness and faithfulness to God's people. Psalm 22 is nearly perfect as a personal lament that then extends its scope to the larger community, the congregation of the faithful. When you are feeling down and out, in a place in your life that is not good, what can you say about our God that inspires you? How do you find hope in those seemingly hopeless times? Write your thought here and perhaps think about what you might write as a personal lament.

### Wednesday, April 12

Read Psalm 22 and John 19:28-30. Jesus' last words from the cross were, "It is finished!" The Gospel of John recorded these final words of Jesus from the cross. They actually echo words from our Psalm 22, verse 15: "my mouth is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue sticks to my jaws; you lay me in the dust
