already creating an understanding of the relationship they have with Jesus by calling him "Rabbi." They are willing to place themselves into Jesus' care as their teacher, mentor, Lord and Savior. Pastor Jack changed the context of the question in terms of saying that the disciples were searching and they wanted to know who Jesus was and how he was thinking about their shared faith and the ministry and mission Jesus was hoping to launch. It seems a right and fair thing to ask of a leader. If Jesus would have received that question in that context, how do you think he would have responded? What do you think? How would you like Jesus to answer that question? Pray for wisdom as you write your idea here.

Thursday, July 20

Read John 1:35-42; 6:1-11 and 12:20-33. These are the three example of Andrew bringing others to Jesus beginning with his brother, Simon Peter. Jesus, upon meeting Simon changed his name to Peter. These examples are the reason Andrew is dubbed "the bringer." It is a wonderful blessing when members of a church are excited about their faith and the community in which they live their faith enough to invite others to "come and see" the ministry and mission of the church. When was the last time you invited someone to come to church with you? Have you ever intentionally begun a relationship for the sole purpose of introducing them to your Christian faith? What would you imagine you saying when offering such a conversation?

Friday, July 21

It was shared in the message that Andrew seemed contented to take "a behind the scenes, secondary position to others" allowing them to be in the limelight. Andrew was blessed in his ability to ring others to Jesus. How about you? Do you like to work "behinds the scene" or in a "secondary position?" Would you find that work meaningful? Pray about that calling and whether or not that might be your part in Christ's mission and ministry today.

Daily Devotional Guide

The following is a daily devotional and study guide meant to enhance your understanding of the message and grow as a Christian.

Monday, July 17

The message began with a scenario derived from the historical records of the time in which the disciple Andrew lived; the same time period in which Jesus lived. It was truly a time of the Jewish people being oppressed by the occupying forces of Rome. The prophetic voice of the Jewish people had been silent for over 400 years. Into that void came a very strange and outspoken man who came to be known as John the Baptizer. John was actually Jesus'

cousin born approximately six months before Jesus. John preached about a new life for his people; all they had to do was repent and change their lives. People flocked to be baptized by John. Baptism is a ritual that symbolizes death (submersion under the water) and rebirth (coming up out of the water). Andrew along with his people was ready for this new life proclaimed by John the Baptizer. How are you ready for new life? Are you willing to give up your old life? What changes are you willing to make in order to know God more deeply and follow Christ each day? Consider these questions and write your reflection here.

Tuesday, July 18

Read John 1:35-42. Andrew was a disciple of John the Baptist before he was a follower of Jesus the Christ. This should not be a surprise as John was always open and honest that he was heralding the coming of one who is greater than he; whose sandals he was unworthy to carry. So in the passage you just read as John stood with Andrew and another disciple (thought to be John), John proclaimed Jesus to be "The Lamb of God." Andrew and the other disciples followed Jesus.

When Jesus looked back at the two men, he asked, "What are you looking for?" (Verse 38) It is a great question as we consider our faith and develop a deeper understanding of our life on this earth. What are you looking for? What do you perceive to be your greatest need? What changes for your life do you desire? How would you answer Jesus' question? Contemplate these questions and write your thoughts here.
