person. Studying the Bible involves more than just reading it; especially in a language in which it was not originally written (Hebrew in the Old Testament, Greek for the New). We need to understand the original context in which the scripture was written, the meaning of words used within that context and society, etc. Certainly, it is meant to honor John when his name is connected with this body of work. What your thoughts about the authorship of scripture in general and these books specifically? Why does this matter? Do each of these books have the same weight in terms of their validity and meaning? Record your ideas here.

Thursday, August 10

Read John 19:16b-27. John, once called a son of thunder became the disciple whom Jesus loved. John was the only disciple at the cross where Jesus died. He was the man with whom Jesus entrusted his mother, Mary. That seems like an amazing transformation and it's for certain that it didn't happen overnight but rather over the three years John spent with Jesus as part of his inner circle. John's transformation may have continued after Jesus left this world! How has your life been transformed by Jesus? How is your life different because of your faith? How long did it take for the difference to be recognized? Meditate on these questions and write your ideas here.

Monday, August 7

Read Luke 9:51-56. It has been mentioned several times that James and John were nicknamed by Jesus as "sons of thunder." No doubt the scripture passage for today contributes to that identity for these two brothers. As mentioned in the message from July 30, anger along with a vengeful zeal is never a good combination. Several people in response to that same message shared that their concern about their own anger and anger that seems so prevalent in our society. What is your thoughts about the ever-present anger that seems to fuel a lot of rage in our country and even the world? Do you have personal concerns

about your own anger? What do you believe could be done to stop people from acting on their anger? Perhaps you don't see a problem with anger in our world or country? Contemplate these questions and write your reflections here.

Tuesday, August 8

Read Mark 9:33-41. Yesterday we considered the thought that anger is a world-wide problem. Today, let's consider the underlying cause or the root of anger. For John in addition to a vengeful zeal and the ambitious desire to occupy a place of honor beside Jesus, he also seems to be dealing with bigotry. That means he is prejudice against anyone who is not a part of those who specifically followed Jesus. In the passage you just read, John tried to stop a healer from healing in Jesus' name. Jesus rebuked John saying that if that man isn't saying anything foul or untrue about Jesus, then leave him be. If he is not against Jesus and his followers, then he is for them. What do you believe fuels anger in others? What causes you to be angry? Bigotry, racism, sexism, fear of the unknown, not understanding others can all lead to anger that is all too often acted out in violence. Is it ever alright to be angry? Take a moment to think about the underlying causes of anger and write your thoughts here. Read Ephesians 4:26-27 to shed some more light on these questions.
