When he dies, he finds comfort in the heavenly realm – resting in the presence of Abraham, the Father of Israel. The rich man who descends into hades when he dies has lived a live oblivious to the needs of others.

While this parable illustrates that life is not always smooth for those who are God's people, it does give us pause to contemplate on what we focus. Yesterday, we spoke of goals. Today, meditate on what you need to focus each day to achieve those goals. Do you have step-by-step plans to achieve your goals? Do you have contingency plans if things go wrong? Write your thoughts here and pray for the confidence to live your life in light of God's love, forgiveness and guidance!

Monday, October 16

Read Jeremiah 32:1-3a, 6-15. Prophecy is often misunderstood. Many believe that prophecy involved the telling of future events, far off into the future as a mystical explanation. While prophecy often involves the predicting of events far into the future, prophecy is truly a cause and effect endeavor. Many Biblical prophecies involved the warning of future devastations in the face of current mistakes. King Zedekiah did not listen to counsel about following God's ways and therefore receiving blessings. The integrity and inner strength of the nation was compromised.

There are many elements of life today that we know to be true when it comes to current behavior producing future results. If you smoke, you increase your chances of contracting lung cancer. If a woman drinks alcohol in excessive amounts while pregnant, the child's health can be damaged. Jeremiah is saying to King

Zedekiah that you cannot ignore God's guidance and expect God's blessings. What do you think about prophecy? What would you expect as future blessings from following God's guidance today? Write your thoughts here and pray for clarity of God's guidance upon your life.

Tuesday, October 17

Read Jeremiah 1:1-10. This passage of scripture is the beginning of Jeremiah's prophetic career — when he was very young. It is his call story, when God placed an expectation upon Jeremiah to be a teller of truth — a prophet. Clergy often speak of God's call upon their lives; it can be as simple as a trusted friend suggesting that a person look at this life commitment to a very spiritual experience of inner urgings from God. In the passage you just read, Jeremiah is having a conversation with God.

How about you? How do you perceive God communicating with you? How does your understanding of what God wants for your life affect your daily living? What is it that you believe God wants you to do?
