Thursday, April 18

Pastor Jack introduced a "25 cent word" from his seminary days: Theodicy. It's basically the question of how in the universe, created by a loving and caring Creator, can suffering and evil exists. Of course, you've heard the message and know how this question of theodicy was answered. The question of theodicy wants to make sense of the world and in essence, address the statements and question that Epicurus developed. Are there times when the world doesn't make sense to you? Like Asaph are you frustrated with the flagrant evil and injustice in our world? Are you offended by that evil and injustice? Meditate on these questions and write your response here.

Friday, April 19

Read Revelation 21:1-7. The answer, at least in part, to the question of theodicy is free will. God is love and in order to allow us to love God in return, we must have free will. If you are coerced into loving someone then that is certainly not love. Love is a choice and if God gives us the choice to love, then we also can choose evil. In short, creation itself – specifically humanity – is the reason for evil in the world. The choice between loving and doing evil is ours to make, however, there is one constant for certain: God is good all the time and all the time God is good! Daily Devotional Guide

The following is a daily devotional and study guide meant to enhance your understanding of the message and grow as a Christian.

Monday, April 15

The Message began with a question: Have you ever doubted the goodness of God? In the very first chapter of the very first book of our Bible – Genesis, Chapter 1 – all that exists is created and

God calls it good. On the sixth day when humanity is created, God calls creation "very good." Yet there is plenty of evidence to suggest there is a great deal about our little portion of creation that is not good and in fact evil. So think again about the question with which we began the message, Have you ever doubted the goodness of God? Meditate on this question and write your reflections here.

Tuesday, April 16

Epicurus was a Greek philosopher who lived 300 years before Jesus. In speaking about God and evil, he came up with two statements and a question. First he asked, "If God is not able to prevent evil, if he can't stop bad things from happening, then God must not be all-powerful." Second he said, "If God's not willing to prevent evil, then he must not be all good." Then Epicurus asked, "If God is both willing and able to prevent evil, then why does evil exist?"

Rabbi Harold Kushner, in his book *When Bad Things Happen to Good People* suggested that while God is all-powerful, he gives up his power so that we may have free will. What do you think of Epicurus' statements and questions? What do you think of Rabbi Kushner's comment? After some quiet meditation and prayerful thought, write your reflection here.

Wednesday, April 17

Read Psalm 73:1-17. If you have time, read all of Psalm 73. This is one of twelve Psalms attributed to Asaph. He is disturbed about the wicked that prosper and are arrogant. Asaph was close with our loving Creator and the world did not make sense to him as he believed that God was a just and good God. Skim over Psalm 73 and look for words that are evidence of Asaph's frustration and
