God. Take a moment and compose a prayer that would lead you to a deeper knowledge of God and pray for that which you can honestly say is in full alignment with God's will. Write your prayer here; it doesn't have to be long, just authentic. Contemplate the power of prayer as you compose your prayer.

Thursday, May 16

The third element of building a bridge of trust is surrender. As mentioned during the message, surrender doesn't mean giving up but rather making yourself available to hearing God's answer to our prayers and the actions that God would want us to take in response to God's guidance. The fact that the Hebrew words for trust, *betach* and *bittachon*, mean to lie prostrate in front of God brings up the idea of different body positions during prayer. You don't' have to lie down on your stomach facing the floor, but perhaps you might outstretch your arms as your pray or hold your hands palm up as if to anticipate receiving God's blessing. What does surrender mean to you? What changes in your life would you anticipate in surrendering your will to God's will? Contemplate these questions and write your responses here.

Friday, May 17

The message ended with a call to action in response to the process of questioning, praying and surrendering. For three days you have examined this "blueprint" to building a bridge of trust with God. What actions do you believe God is asking of you? What changes in your life would you have to make to implement those actions? What impact would your expect from your actions? Remember the story with which Pastor Jack ended the message: If you pray, fast and work toward receiving the blessing of rain, don't forget your umbrella! Write your responses here.
