There is an experiment that demonstrates how our brain works and is conditioned to recognize certain stimuli. One person stands in the middle of two other people and listens while the people on each side read from a book. One person reading would insert the middle person's name into the reading about every 20 words. After the reading the middle person was asked, "Did you hear anything unusual?" Not only did the person hear his name, but he knew how many times his name was said!

When many voices compete for our attention, how do we hear the voice of God? How does God most effectively speak to you? Through scripture reading? Through prayer? Through worship? Through music? What conditions are most conducive to your hearing God? Meditate on these questions and write your thoughts here.

Friday, January 17

Part of being able to hear God's voice among the din of many other voices is knowing the nature of God's message to us. Just as we recognize the voice of another person not only by the sound of his or her voice but through the phrases that person uses, we can identify God's voice by the content of God's message to us. A message of love and affirmation. A voice that sends us forth into the world with a message of forgiveness and acceptance.

Monday, January 13

What memories do you have of baptisms? Perhaps you remember your own baptism or a baptism you witnessed that was particularly moving. What made that sacrament so

memorable? Was it the setting? Was it the people involved in the baptism? Meditate upon your memories and write your thoughts here.

Tuesday, January 14

Baptism is truly God's moment. It is a moment in which we recognize God's love: A moment when we recognize God's favor. A moment in which we recognize God's direction for our lives. Baptism is an affirmation of our faith – as parents and a congregation. Baptism recognizes the affirmation we receive from our faith community.

During the ritual of Baptism, we pay a great deal of attention to many details from the clothes we wear to the details of where we will stand, the responses we read and the music we sing. We don't want to miss the fact that baptism is primarily about God and our relationship with God. Think about the memorable baptisms from yesterday. How did God fit into your memories? Pray a prayer of thanksgiving for God's presence in our rituals and in our lives!

Wednesday, January 15

Baptism is about receiving God's affirmation; to hear God's voice lifting us up and sending us forth. Yet there are many voices that compete for our attention, time and resources.
