#### Thursday, May 15

Read Luke 13:31-35. Jesus was soon to enter the City of Jerusalem and a little over a week from his lament over the city, Jesus would be crucified and risen again. A unique part of Jesus' prayer is the feminine presentation of himself as a hen sheltering and protecting her brood of chicks. These five verses are full of symbolism and deeper meaning. There is even a fun play on the words as Jesus calls Herod Antipas a fox. Perhaps this is where the phrase "fox in the henhouse" originated.

The word "house" alone is full of meaning and certainly the house of Herod was incredibly corrupt, incestuous and violent. Jesus lamented that his people, the Jews, collaborated with Herod and the greater Roman Empire. How about your house? Is it in order? Do you see the hypocrisy of people in leadership inhabiting a house that is in disarray? What other lessons can be extracted from this brief Gospel Passage? Mediate on these questions and write you thoughts here.

## Friday, May 16

The message this past Sunday ended with, "May we seek out those who are living in desolate houses, living desolate lives and may we, strengthened by God's Spirit seek to make a difference in those lives." This is a call to get involved in missions and ministries that make a difference in the lives of others. As far as we have journeyed through this Message Series, are there some issues that tug at your heart strings? Where and how would you like to get involved in any of the issues presented so far? Think about these issues as opportunities to make a difference in our local church area and the world by seeking to change our world with the love of Jesus Christ.
