We've all heard of the soccer mom who believe that their child needs to play every minute of every game or the baseball dad that yells at the coach wanting his child to play in a certain position they deem more important than others. This is sometimes the fodder for comics and late-night TV hosts.

The simple fact is we all need to come to terms in understanding our gifts and graces. How can we best nurture our children toward their greatest avenue of success? How do we help them identify their strengths while incubating within them the skills to advance and utilize their strengths? If we knew the answers to these questions, there wouldn't be so many books on parenting. At some point we have to become adults and deal with our strengths and recognize our limitations. ### Friday, August 8

The second problem with greatness is confusion about the true meaning of greatness. For Jesus, the true measure of greatness is service. And Jesus lived his life, gave his life in service to humanity. That is what he meant when he told Salome, James and John "You will indeed drink my cup, but to sit at my right hand and at my left, this is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared by my Father." Jesus sensed that they are confused about what they are getting into, and he makes clear that the path to glory goes straight through the wilderness of suffering. This wasn't necessarily a positive nickname, possibly implying the zeal and loyalty they had for their Rabbi and Savior, Jesus. Rather, it refers to impetuousness of the brothers, especially James. James was a bit of a hothead. This name Jesus bestowed upon the brothers was definitely an indication that he knew them well, possibly revealing that they are his cousin or at least a relative of some sort. What do you think of when you hear Sons of Thunder? How does this nickname relate to the fact that James and John, along with Peter were in Jesus inner circle of disciples? Write you ideas here.

### Wednesday, August 6

Read Matthew 20:20-28. Here we read the words of a mother who wants the best for her sons and how she wants them to be honored with places of honor. Is Salome being unreasonable in this request? Isn't this what all parents, mothers in particular, want for their children? What's your experience with your parents or with your children? What guidance have you received from your parents or given to your children that will help them achieve a certain degree of status and respect?
