Daily Devotional Guide

The following is a daily devotional and study guide meant to enhance your understanding of the message and grow as a Christian.

It is offered for your personal reflection or to share with others.

Monday, September 1

The message opened with some thoughts about the place of women in the culture and society that Jesus lived. Subservient and almost always connected to a man, women are not thought capable of engaging in deep meaningful conversations. The position of women during Jesus' time, the early church and even to this day are based on human traditions rather than Biblical ordinances. What are your thoughts about tradition verse Biblical guidance? Contemplate these concepts and write your reflection here.

Tuesday, September 2

Read John 4:1-42. This reading proceeds quickly. Think about the woman whom Jesus met at Jacob's well. We're told that she is not following the customs of her time, going to the well early in the morning (or in the evening) to avoid the heat of the day. Rather, she is going to the well during the warmest part of the day. Most scholars agree that the woman is avoiding the other women in her village and their judgmental stares. In truth, we don't really know the circumstances of the woman's life; we are simply aware of her pain and shame. So often religious people bring cast judgment upon others rather than view them through eyes of compassion and caring. The church is often accused of being "judgy" and hypocritical when it comes to viewing people with lifestyles different from its perceived norm. Consider the pain the woman who met Jesus at the well is feeling and consider the fact that she may not have much control over her situation. Wednesday, September 3

Read again John 4:1-42. Today, let's consider Jesus as we see him sitting near Jacob's well.
