The third and fourth lessons that Jethro demonstrates are affirm and advise. I (Pastor Jack), worked with a Senior Pastor who, when he wanted to offer me advise or constructive criticism, would always begin his statement with something like, "Jack, you're just too sharp of a guy to be doing.... whatever he thought I was doing wrong." Because my colleague in ministry utilized this method so often, it began to be a little trite and a bit corny. His affirmation wasn't specific enough to indicate that he truly had something positive to say about my performance. Jethro, by watching and asking questions connects his advice to what he's seen and clarified for himself. The results were very positive and Moses is counted as a great leader not only in scripture but in history. We can easily see that great leaders listen themselves, as Moses did. Again, what has been your experience? What do you value in people offering you advise? Do you use any of these methods in your counsel to others? Contemplate these questions and write your reflection here.

The names of Moses and Zipporah provide an identity for God's people, the Israelites. Gershom means "a foreigner there" or "stranger there."
