Thursday, October 30

Read the entirety of Psalm 27. In verse 4, David says that the one thing he would "seek after" is "to live in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the LORD and to inquire in his temple." David felt at his best and happy when he was in God's presence. Think of a time when you felt you were in God's presence. Close your eyes and imagine where you were at the time and who was with you. Perhaps you were alone, perhaps reading scripture, praying or listening to inspiring music. Try and remember what you were sensing at that time of being in God's presence. What did you smell, hear, see, touch or taste? What emotions were you experiencing? Spend some time imagining what it felt like to be in God's presence. Now take some time contemplating a time in which you felt far from God. Think of the same questions above, closing your eyes to imagine that feeling. Write your reflections about these experiences of God. End your day by praying for God's presences and protection.

Friday, October 31

Read one more time and very carefully Psalm 27. Pay attention to how many times God is mentioned. While it is true that this Psalm is all about God, it was written from the perspective of human suffering and need. When we are in difficult times, it is helpful to remember that God is with us and has done marvelous things for us. We remember, review and rehearse times in which we've experienced God's goodness and celebrate what God has done for us, what God can do for us and our reliance on God's loving and just nature. We also rely on God's mercy and forgiveness which is born out of God's compassion for all humanity. Pray for God's presence as you seek God's face and presence in your life daily. What temptations do you deal with on a daily basis? As you meditate on these ideas and write your thoughts here, asking for God's love, forgiveness and pathway back to health and wholeness.

Wednesday, October 29

Read Psalm 27:1,4-9. If you were to ask the Lord for one thing, what would it be? What is the main thing for most of us? Pastor Jack offered a list of things that many people mention when challenged with this question: more time, to be in a happy place, to be successful, to be in a good and healthy relationship, to be safe, to live in a civil society, flexible work hours with remote work options and self-discipline.
