Tuesday, December 16

Read Luke 1:26-38. The story of the annunciation is a wonderful demonstration of interaction between a human and a divine being, the angel Gabriel. What many people focus on is the dogma of the Virgin Birth. Scottish Theologian and author, William Barclay wrote that the church does not require our belief in the Virgin Birth. There are many who would disagree with Barclay and yet, some have their doubts. Barclay wrote, "The Jews had a saying that in the mother and the birth of every child there are three partners – the father, the mother and the Spirit of God. They believed that no child could ever be born without the Spirit. And it may well be that the New Testament stories of the birth of Jesus are lovely, poetical ways of saying that, even if he had a human father, the Holy Sprit of God was operative in his birth in a unique way." Wow! What do you think? How important is the Virgin Birth to your faith? Contemplate these words of Barclay and write your thoughts here.
