The image of God wiping away our tears and death, crying, mourning and pain will be no more, must give solace to Christ's followers. Read again Verses 3 and 4. Take time to thank God for his mercy for each and everyone who calls his name. Reflect on the darkness of our times and pray that God's light will bring clarity into our world exposing the devastation caused by the darkness. Record your thoughts here

### Thursday, January 1

Read John 1:1-18. Within this prologue of John's Gospel, we do not find another birth narrative as in Matthew and Luke's Gospel. Rather we find a rich source of beliefs about our God and Jesus our Savior. From these verses we learn that Jesus, like God has always existed (verse 1), that Jesus is the light of God shining in the darkest corners of our human existence (verse 5). We learn that the Christ was involved in creation (verse 10) and that through Christ we are given the power to become children of God (verse 12). Even though John's presentation of how Christ came into the world lacks the warmth of Matthew and Luke's birth narratives, John's words certainly give Christ's followers hope. What are your thoughts? Write them here giving praise to our loving Creator and Christ our Lord and Savior.

### Friday, January 2

### Monday, December 29

We work so hard and are so busy leading up to the holiday that we forget that Christmas is a "Holy Day." In centuries past, Christmas was just the beginning of celebrations as in *The Twelve Days of Christmas*. Have you ever experienced the "post-Christmas let down?" Have you ever felt sad while taking down the decorations? Think about these ideas and write our reflections here.

### Tuesday, December 30

It was mentioned that the Advent Messages presented dual messages of judgment and mercy. It has even been suggested by some worship experts that Advent is actually a "little Lent." While this past week's message looked forward to the blessings of Christ's victory over evil in the world, the battle between good and evil was hard fought according to the Book of Revelation.
