### **Monday, February 9**

The Message began with the illustration of a granddaughter riding on the shoulders of her grandfather. A friend commented on how much she grown since the last time he saw the little girl. The girl responded, “Not all of this is me!” We have all ridden on the shoulders of those who have gone before us, who have supported us in our endeavors and accomplishments. Think about these people in your life. Who are they? Family? Friends? Your spouse or partner? Perhaps your list is very long. Take some time to think about the influence of these people in your life. List them below and think about what you’ve been able to accomplish because of them. Pray a prayer of thanksgiving for their lives and for the way they have blessed your life. ### **Tuesday, February 10**

Read Acts 2:1-21. If you are able, read this passage out loud; don’t worry about saying all the words correctly. Just recognize that there were many people in Jerusalem from many different areas. Meditate on what the experience of receiving the gift of the Holy Spirit must have been like: the sound, the sight of tongues of fire lighting upon Christ’s followers, the feel of the excited crowd around the disciples. What emotions do you believe the people on that first Pentecost felt?

We all stand upon the “shoulders” of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is God’s gift to us as Jesus left this world; it is the continual presence of God on earth since that first Pentecost. We live in the Age of the Holy Spirit! Have you ever felt the presence and support of the Holy Spirit? Have you ever thought about your accomplishments and how the Holy Spirit has enabled you? Meditate on these questions and write your thoughts here.

### **Wednesday, February 11**

During the message, three ways the Holy Spirit enables us were mentioned. The first way the Holy Spirit enables us is our ability to forgive. The Apostle Paul wrote, “Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive.” Our ability to forgive is the result of God’s forgiveness of us. It has been said that to forgive means to no longer hold another responsible for the pain of any misdeed we have suffered as a result of another’s actions. It means to release them for any responsibility for your continued pain. How does your forgiveness of another person reflect God’s forgiveness of you? Write your reflections here.
